<i>Bridging the Gap: Advancing Age-Friendly Health Care for Older Adults in Rural Utah</i>	Sunbrook A
Description: Utah’s rural older adults face growing challenges in accessing coordinated, high-quality health care services. Workforce shortages, geographic isolation, transportation barriers, behavioral health needs, caregiver strain, digital inequities, and fragmented systems all contribute to disparities in health outcomes. Veterans and underserved populations in rural communities often experience even greater barriers to care continuity and specialized services. This three-hour interdisciplinary conference explores the current state of rural aging and health care delivery in Utah while highlighting innovative strategies that improve access, coordination, and outcomes for older adults. Participants will examine age-friendly health system principles, veteran-centered care models, telehealth and emerging technologies, behavioral health integration, caregiver support, and community partnerships that strengthen rural systems of care. Using the Age-Friendly Health Systems “4Ms” framework—What Matters, Medication, Mentation, and Mobility—participants will identify practical, scalable next steps Utah can take to improve rural aging services, reduce gaps, strengthen collaboration, and create a more responsive statewide system for older adults and family caregivers.

<i>Building the Future of Rural Telehealth: Utah’s LIFT Initiative, Telehealth Alliance Priorities, and an AI Scribe Success in Rural Care</i>	Sunbrook B



Description: Utah's rural communities are entering a pivotal moment for telehealth transformation. This session will provide an in-depth look at the Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP) LIFT Initiative, including Year One milestones and progress and priorities for Year Two. Participants will gain insight into statewide telehealth infrastructure planning, digital readiness efforts, and the early implementation strategies shaping Utah's five-year transformation roadmap. The session will also include an update on the Telehealth Alliance Steering Committee, a multi-sector group guiding statewide telehealth strategy, identifying priority needs, and informing funding recommendations. Attendees will learn how the Alliance is shaping Utah's telehealth ecosystem and how rural partners can engage in upcoming planning and implementation activities. To ground the discussion in real-world innovation, the workshop will highlight a telehealth-enabled AI scribe use case featuring Moab Regional Hospital and AVO, an AI-powered clinical documentation tool (https://www.avomd.com/). This case study will explore how rural providers are leveraging AI to reduce administrative burden, improve documentation accuracy, and increase provider capacity—demonstrating how emerging technologies can support sustainable telehealth expansion in frontier settings. Participants will leave with a clearer understanding of statewide telehealth priorities, opportunities for collaboration, and practical examples of innovation that can be replicated across rural Utah.

1B	<i>Closing the Distance in Rural Utah: How to Build a Volunteer Transportation Program</i>	Sunbrook B
	Description: Rural transportation barriers limit access to healthcare, food, and other essential services, especially in geographically isolated communities. This breakout session will highlight a successful volunteer rideshare program developed in rural Utah through local partnerships and innovative funding strategies. Marry Ramirez will share how the program was built through collaboration with partners in Sanpete and Millard counties and support from Intermountain Health's Community Health Grant Fund to reimburse volunteer drivers. Attendees will learn practical strategies for building partnerships, securing funding, establishing referral processes, and recruiting and retaining volunteer drivers. The session will also cover lessons learned, common challenges, and the program's impact on improving access to medical appointments, food resources, and other essential services, with strategies that can be adapted in other rural communities.

1D	<i>Breaking the Cycle: Trauma, Biology, and Rural Care</i> Description: Rural providers often care for patients whose health is shaped by early adversity, limited resources, and multigenerational stress. This session will explore how emerging research in epigenetics explains the impact of trauma, poverty, and chronic stress on gene expression and long-term physical and mental health outcomes, translating complex science into practical clinical applications for rural healthcare professionals. Participants will examine how adverse childhood experiences and toxic stress may appear in common rural clinical settings, including depression, chronic disease, behavioral health concerns, and substance use. The session will emphasize resilience, neuroplasticity, and opportunities for prevention and early intervention, while highlighting practical trauma-informed strategies that can be integrated into time-limited, resource-constrained rural practice settings. 2A	<i>Interested in rural GME? What you need to know, from community need to financing</i> Description: This breakout session will provide an overview of the requirements and pathways for establishing rural Graduate Medical Education (GME) programs, including key accreditation components and terminology such as Sponsoring Institution (SI), Designated Institutional Official (DIO), and Program Director (PD). Participants will learn how Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services funds GME programs through Direct Graduate Medical Education (DGME) and Indirect Medical Education (IME) payments, while reviewing common program structures, challenges, and “gotchas” to avoid. The session will also highlight Utah-specific funding opportunities, including state grant funding and potential Rural Hospital Technical Program (RHTP) support available to help launch new GME programs in Utah. 2B	<i>From Assessment to Action: Improving Healthy Food Access in Rural Utah</i>	Sunbrook B
	Description: Access to healthy, affordable food is essential for overall health, yet many rural Utah communities face barriers such as long travel distances, limited retail options, transportation challenges, and high food costs, contributing to disparities in health outcomes. This session will highlight Get Healthy Utah's Healthy Food Access Project in rural Utah, a community-informed, nationally funded initiative supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and Urban Institute. Using examples from Price and Carbon County, participants will learn how tools such as Healthy Food Walk Audits, surveys, and mapping were used to identify barriers including transportation, affordability, and access to culturally relevant foods, and translate findings into local strategies. Attendees will also be introduced to Get Healthy Utah's guide, "How to Conduct a Healthy Food Access Assessment," and leave with practical tools and a replicable process for improving food access in their own communities.

For rural facilities, this means reputation and digital presence directly influence recruitment success. 2D	<i>Combined Purpose, Greater Impact: Unifying Rural Disability and Mental Health Systems Through Cross-Sector Partnerships</i>	Entrada A
	Description: Rural communities face higher disability prevalence, elevated suicide rates, workforce shortages, and limited behavioral health infrastructure. For individuals with disabilities, these challenges are compounded by isolation, transportation barriers, stigma, and fragmented systems of care that operate in silos. This session will highlight the Multicultural Disability Network and Training (MULDINET) initiative, which	



	strengthens statewide collaboration and improves access to inclusive community supports for people with disabilities across rural and diverse populations. Over the past three years, MULDINET has grown to approximately 450 members across more than 20 organizations, supporting shared learning and resource alignment. Through case examples, including online learning resources, regional convenings, and collaborative resource development, participants will explore strategies to strengthen cross-sector partnerships, reduce fragmentation, and build more integrated rural disability and behavioral health systems.

3A	<i>Community Rootedness: How Building Community Engagement Experiences into Underserved Medical Education can Enrich Rural Clinical Training</i>	Sunbrook A
	Description: Rural Medical Education at the Spencer Fox Eccles School of Medicine (SFESOM) is grounded in connection to place and community. RUUTE (Rural and Underserved Utah Training Experience) and TRUE (Tribal, Rural and Urban Underserved Education) are integrating to develop an Underserved Medicine Curriculum as the Southern Utah Regional Medical Campus welcomes its first rural-focused student cohort. The RUUTE Community Engagement Experience (CEE) immerses students in rural and underserved communities through either a one-month clinical block or a longitudinal clerkship. Students engage in community health modules, needs assessments, and interviews, culminating in a community-specific health intervention that can be expanded into a TRUE capstone project. Through sustained partnerships with clinicians, public health partners, and communities across Utah, these experiences build skills in community engagement, population health, and health systems improvement while strengthening rural training pathways and relationships with preceptors.

	Description: By 2026, the question is no longer 'Can we share data?' but 'How do we make that data work for us?' For rural providers, interoperability is often viewed as an administrative burden or a technical hurdle. This session breaks down the national interoperability landscape—including the maturing TEFCA framework and the latest CMS Interoperability & Prior Authorization mandates—through a rural lens. We will explore how standardized data (USCDI v7) and modern APIs are finally moving the needle on reducing clinician burnout and automating burdensome tasks like prior authorizations. 3D	<i>Protecting Rural Health Transformation Funding: Practical Strategies for Grant Compliance and Fraud Prevention</i>	Entrada A
	Description: Rural Health Transformation Program and other Federal Program funding can be a lifeline for rural providers, but with it comes heightened scrutiny and increased exposure to compliance risk, fraud, waste, and abuse. This session shows how organizations can protect these dollars by translating grant requirements into practical, day-to-day controls that withstand audit and regulatory review. This presentation will educate participants on key compliance areas, including allowable costs, cost allocation, and documentation expectations, along with common pitfalls that lead to findings or questioned costs. The session will also examine how fraud risks emerge within grant-funded operations, distinguishing between control breakdowns, unintentional noncompliance, and indicators of misconduct. Using real-world scenarios, participants will learn how to implement right-sized internal controls and monitoring practices that are defensible, sustainable, and tailored to resource-constrained rural environments.
